Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: This week's gospel introduces John the Baptist, often called the last of the Old

Testament prophets. John is a brilliant example of the gospel proclamation, particularly because of his way of living. He is depicted as a wilderness man, living in the desert, eating

locusts and wild honey – this cannot help but provoke our curiosity. In his time, John's unique ascetic way of life gives credibility to his preaching, not the other way around. In ours, hypocrisy in the church is one of the great counter-witnesses to the love of Christ. The church is holy primarily because Christ is holy, not because we are, but we are nonetheless called to follow after that holiness as best we can. John calls us to repentance and to seek the kingdom of God, especially as we serve in ministerial roles within the church. Our lives can, like John, bring people toward Jesus. If we are not careful, however, we can also push them away.

To Experience: Given the broken and war-torn state of our world today, it might be difficult to trust that the peace and justice of God will ever come to fruition. Violence and conflict seem to prevail in our families, our neighborhoods, our countries, and throughout the world. This can overwhelm us and make us feel small and useless in the face of evil. Today's readings invite us to trust above all in the kingship of Christ, who will bring peace and will bring justice. The Christian faith is one of hope rather than despair, life rather than death, and light rather than darkness.

- 1. The psalm speaks of the "profound peace" that God brings. Where do you need God's peace in your life, and how can you bring peace to those around you?
- 2. Paul reminds us that the Scriptures can be a source of hope in the Christian life. Which stories or passages from Scripture have you found most encouraging?

The Path of Humility

My Dear Friends in Christ,

A woman claimed that she had the power to perform miracles. Crowds of people flocked to her house. The bishop, who heard about this, sent a priest to find out if God's power was truly at work in the woman. The priest went to the woman's house via a muddy path filled with filth and asked the woman to wash his muddy slippers and feet. The woman refused. The priest returned to the bishop and told him that the power of God was not in the woman even to the measure of a mustard seed because she did not have even a trace of humility.

As we prepare for the coming of Christ in this holy season of Advent, the Gospel reading introduces John the Baptist, a rugged prophet calling us to the wilderness to "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near".

His message breaks through the noise of our busy lives, demanding a preparation that is more than just outward appearances or religious status.

Much like the woman in the story who claimed the power to perform miracles but lacked the fundamental grace of humility, we can fall into the trap of spiritual pride. The woman refused to wash the dusty feet of the priest because she saw herself as above such a lowly act. Her refusal revealed the absence of genuine divine power, which is always rooted in a servant heart.

John the Baptist, in stark contrast, demonstrated true humility. Despite drawing massive crowds, he insisted that he was not the Messiah and was not even worthy to perform the most menial task for the one who was coming: "I am not worthy to carry his sandals". He knew his purpose was simply to point to Jesus and decrease so that Christ might increase. Where there is no humility, the power of God cannot be expected. The life of Saint John the Baptist himself was a sign of simplicity and humility. He shunned luxury, wore simple clothes, ate simple food, hated arrogance, and did his work in the desert.

Let us follow the path of John the Baptist this week, shedding our pride and making a straight path for the Lord, so that we may greet the coming King with genuine humility and a repentant spirit.

Are we ready to bend down and wash some muddy feet?



St. Nicholas Feast Day: December 6

When is St. Nicholas Day?

St. Nicholas Day is celebrated on December 6. In 2025, this is on a Saturday.

Who is St. Nicholas?

St. Nicholas was a bishop of an ancient Greek town called Myra, in present-day Turkey. He may have attended the first Council of Nicaea, where he is rumored to have punched Arius, a heretic, in the face. He was born around March 15, 270 and died on December 6, 343.

St. Nicholas always had a love for the poor and would work for their benefit. The story goes that there was a poor man in town with no money for a dowry for his daughters. No dowry meant no marriage, which would have left his daughters to be sold into a life of servitude. Late one night, St. Nicholas dropped a bag of money down the chimney of the family home, thus allowing the daughters a dowry.

Most famously, he is the real-life historical figure from whom we get Santa Claus. His generosity inspired the "chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf" - Santa meaning Saint and Claus is short for Nicholas.



On December 5, the eve of St. Nicholas Day, children traditionally leave a shoe or a boot in front of the fireplace. The next morning the shoe is filled with small gifts, like coins, candy and oranges. The coins are given in remembrance of the coins St. Nicholas left the girls in need of a dowry and oranges are given to signify the gold that St. Nicholas gave away to those in need. This tradition comes from the legends of St. Nicholas' generosity and led to the celebration of Santa Claus on Christmas Day today. In some countries, like Germany and Austria, St. Nicholas is accompanied by his counterpart the Krampus. Much like the legend of Santa Claus, the Krampus will leave coal in the shoes of misbehaving children. Children are encouraged to participate in acts of kindness to stay off of the Krampus' naughty list.

In some countries people begin St. Nicholas Day celebrations with a parade. Many end their day with a celebratory meal. And since St. Nicholas is the patron saint of unmarried women, in Italy it's not just children who receive gifts.

One fun way to celebrate is to make traditional St. Nicholas cookies. In the United States gingerbread and sugar cookies are the most popular while in countries such as the Netherlands and Germany make spice cookies and peppermint cookies. The spice cookies are made into the shape of St. Nicholas - complete with a Bishop's miter and staff!

Another tradition that is observed is to perform random acts of kindness on St. Nicholas' feast day. You could drop off a grocery store gift card to those in need, give books to your parish to use at Christmas, anonymously pay the utility bill of someone in need or donate gifts to local foster care programs. Spend time as a family brainstorming what you can do to serve your community just as St. Nicholas did when he was alive.

Who is St. Nicholas the Patron Saint of?

A patron saint is a saint who is known for praying for and helping people in specific walks of life or particular circumstances. Saints are typically patron saints of people, things and situations that were similar to experiences they had when they were alive.

St. Nicholas is the patron saint of children, bakers, brides, unmarried women, grooms, sailors and travelers. Because he was persecuted for his faith we can to pray for all people who are being persecuted around the world. He was a Bishop, so we can ask him to intercede for bishops. And he helped the poor, sick and suffering, so we can ask him to pray for those most in need in our communities.

The story of St. Nicholas is fun to know and a great way to remind us and our kids that Christmas is about more than just presents.



Parish Project Updates

HT Parish Office Project Following the November council meetings, Fr. Josuva accepted the recommendation from parishioners and council members to move forward with Option 2: Repurpose existing classrooms within the church building. The committee is currently meeting with contractors.

SG Sound Project Work has been happening behind the scenes in preparation for the sound system installation. The sanctuary candle has been moved, outlets for the speakers have been installed in the front pillars, and behind-the-scenes wiring has been put in. Unfortunately, Northern Sound and Video could not begin installation during the first two weeks of December because of another commitment. Based on that information and consideration of the church decorations remaining in place throughout the Christmas season (until Baptism of the Lord on January 11th), the new date to begin the sound system installation is January 14.


