Thoughts for Today's Readings



To the Point: For the first time this liturgical year, we hear one of Jesus' parables in a Sunday gospel, but we also hear Jesus' explanation for their use. Jesus' words here continue in line with his prayer to the Father in last Sunday's gospel

reading. God desires to reveal, but on God's terms, not ours. Those who are able to understand the parable are those who approach it through the lens of faith. It is not for their abstract concepts that hearers are unable to understand Jesus' parables. Jesus intentionally uses relatable imagery; today, a sower and seeds, a familiar image even in our time. While the seed ultimately either bears fruit or does not, there are several ways that the seed fails and only one in which it succeeds – that one being good soil, openness to the word of God that is sown. The proclamation of the gospel demands a lived response, both for the congregation and those who minister. As Jesus says, "Whoever has ears ought to hear."

To Experience: The parable in today's gospel is incredibly practical. Each of the three ways in which the seed fails to produce fruit can be a measuring stick to which we hold up our own response to God. Am I willing to listen to God's promptings, or am I too stubborn to change? Am I in for the long haul, or is following Jesus just a nice idea? Do I provide space for God to work in my life, or do I crowd out God with distractions and lesser things?

1. What kind of soil are you providing for God's word? What steps can you take to help this seed grow?
2. What fears and distractions keep you from allowing God's word to bear fruit?

Hear to Serve....

WORDS

Words are part of our everyday life; they are how we communicate with others. Our words can convey many different things. They give instruction, convey our happiness, joy, sorrow, and our hurt. Words can bring others happiness, or they can bring pain to others. Sometimes our words convey our solemn promise, and sometimes they are meaningless.

Today, we hear about God's words through the prophet Isaiah. The reading begins, "Thus says the Lord." Did you know when you see those four words, it is telling us that God Himself is saying those words to the prophet? It's not the prophet or anyone else interpreting anything for God, but God Himself speaking directly. Powerful to say the least.

God's words are powerful. They are truthful; God's words fulfill what He promises because God does not lie. God's words can alter reality as we know it. We know God created the earth out of a formless, empty, dark void with just His word. When Jesus was in the boat with the Apostles during the storm and they were afraid for their lives, Jesus told the sea to be still, and it was.

God tells us that His words are true and they are powerful. They do not return to Him void or empty; they fulfill what He has promised they will do. We hear from God that His words will water the earth, making it fertile and fruitful, giving seed, bread for people to eat, but we must realize that God the Father is not talking literally. It's not about rain, fertile seeds, or physical bread to eat.

God the Father is talking about The WORD coming to earth, and that is His Son Jesus the Christ. We hear this in the Gospel of John in the prologue. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God, He was in the beginning with God. All things came to be through Him. What came to be through Him was life, and this life was the light of the human race, and the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it."

This is the true meaning of God's words that we hear today from Isaiah. These are words that even Isaiah hadn't figured out. God is going to send His Word, His Son to the earth to water the earth, to make it fruitful and fertile, planting seeds, Jesus will do this with His Gospel. Jesus will give us Bread to eat, Bread that gives us Eternal Life. Jesus gives us His Body and Blood.

So, as we hear about God's words this Sunday let us not think in the literal sense of words because if we do that, we will end up in an empty dark void. Let us pay attention to God's Word our Lord Jesus the Christ so we can be fertile and fruitful and have everlasting life.

Parking Lot Blacktop Project Question**

Dear Parishioners ... We'd Appreciate Your Comments.

A significant portion of our parking lot was dug up from the new septic system project recently completed. Our existing parking lot is over 50 years old. It has numerous cracks from the sun and the cold and has heaved and sunken from winter's cold. It has become so uneven from patching over the years that it is difficult to properly remove snow and ice from winter storms, making walking through the parking lot hazardous at times.

Which leads us to why we are asking for your input. The dug-up portion of the parking lot will need to be patched before winter. We have estimates of about \$10,000 to properly prepare and patch the portion recently dug up from the rectory to the new septic system. This repair will prevent further damage to that area during the next winter and spring, but it will do nothing for the highest-used portion of the parking lot to the east of Church.

We also have estimates to replace the entire parking lot. A project that would cost less than \$150,000 and would eliminate all the existing damage that makes maintenance in winter difficult. It would give us a parking lot that would last for many years to come.

You have been very generous in recent years about capital improvements, which is why we are asking for your thoughts on this potentially large project. There is the possibility of donations to help offset the cost if this becomes a replacement project, but we still would like to hear from you.

On the weekend of July 25 & 26 at the 8am & 7pm Masses, we will be asking for your comments. If you are unable to share your comments at these Masses, please share your comments with the Parish Office before the end of July 2026.

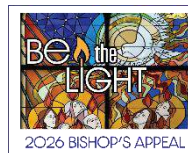

Service Witness Talk

My name is Brenda Valukas and I was asked if I'd be interested in speaking about being a witness of the stewardship of service here at Holy Trinity. Without a hesitation, I said "YES". I've been a member of this parish since I was baptized some 40 years ago, received my first communion here, got confirmed, married my husband Jack (who has also been a member here as long as me), had our children baptized here, and now see them go through the religious education program. My parents and my husband's parents are also members of this parish and have been involved in different stewardship activities over the years.

As far back as I can remember, my first experiences of stewardship and giving back of one's time and talent started here at church for me. From being involved in the children's nativity play and choir, being a server, reader, & greeter for mass services, volunteering at the Salvatorian Center in New Holstein, caroling in the School Hill community, and helping with the annual Perch Fry. Those were just some examples of participation as a youth member of this parish.

As an adult, I look back at all those experiences I was exposed to and I realize that my love for being involved and helping others started right here and it truly helped shape the person I am. As a parent, I try to explain and show my children the importance of stewardship in hopes that they too will also be driven to give back their time to their community. Today, I'm involved with our Parish Council, help coach my daughter's School Hill softball team, assist with Little Saints, and helped in launching our parish's involvement in the Adopt-a-Highway program. Giving of one's time can be a challenge when you have a full-time career and an active family. It's not that these things become less important, it's just re-arranging schedules and making yourself available. It can be done however I never saw it as "having to give up something or sacrificing my time" but approached it happily with the mindset that for me, I was doing something good for the community and parish that I belong to.

St. Kateri Tekakwitha Feast Day – July 14

The blood of martyrs is the seed of saints. Nine years after the Jesuits Isaac Jogues and Jean de Lelande were tomahawked by Iroquois warriors, a baby girl was born near the place of their martyrdom, Auriesville, New York.

Kateri Tekakwitha's mother was a Christian Algonquin, taken captive by the Iroquois and given as wife to the chief of the Mohawk clan, the boldest and fiercest of the Five Nations. When she was four, Tekakwitha lost her parents and little brother in a smallpox epidemic that left her disfigured and half blind. She was adopted by an uncle, who succeeded her father as chief. He hated the coming of the Blackrobes—Jesuit missionaries—but could do nothing to them because a peace treaty with the French required their presence in villages with Christian captives. She was moved by the words of three Blackrobes who lodged with her uncle, but fear of him kept her from seeking instruction.

Tekakwitha refused to marry a Mohawk brave, and at 19 finally got the courage to take the step of converting. She was baptized with the name Kateri—Catherine—on Easter Sunday.

Now she would be treated as a slave. Because she would not work on Sunday, Kateri received no food that day. Her life in grace grew rapidly. She told a missionary that she often meditated on the great dignity of being baptized. She was powerfully moved by God's love for human beings and saw the dignity of each of her people.

She was always in danger, for her conversion and holy life created great opposition. On the advice of a priest, Kateri Tekakwitha stole away one night and began a 200-mile walking journey to a Christian Indian village at Sault St. Louis, near Montreal.

For three years she grew in holiness under the direction of a priest and an older Iroquois woman, giving herself totally to God in long hours of prayer, in charity, and in strenuous penance. At 23, Kateri took a vow of virginity, an unprecedented act for an Indian woman whose future depended on being married. She found a place in the woods where she could pray an hour a day—and was accused of meeting a man there!

Her dedication to virginity was instinctive: Kateri Tekakwitha did not know about religious life for women until she visited Montreal. Inspired by this, she and two friends wanted to start a community, but the local priest dissuaded her. She humbly accepted an "ordinary" life. She practiced extremely severe fasting as penance for the conversion of her nation. Kateri Tekakwitha died the afternoon before Holy Thursday.

Witnesses said that her emaciated face changed color and became like that of a healthy child. The lines of suffering, even the pockmarks, disappeared and the touch of a smile came upon her lips. She was beatified in 1980 and canonized in 2012.

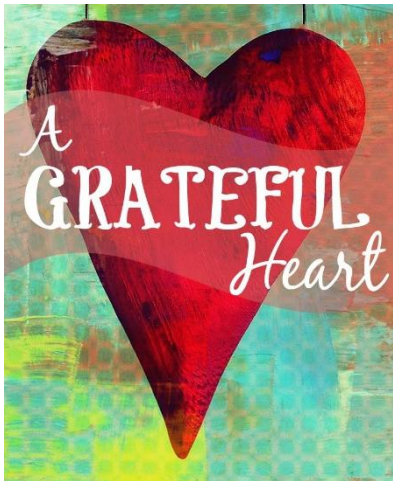
