

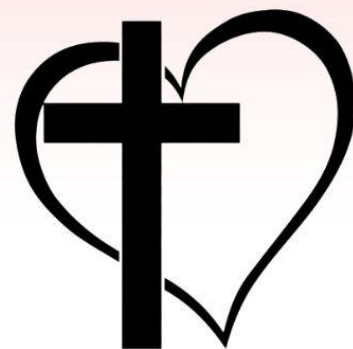

FORGIVENESS: A TWO-WAY STREET

Thoughts for Today's Readings



To the Point: The passion narratives on Palm Sunday and Good Friday are unique in that, in many places, the congregation also proclaims the gospel readings. The twist, of course, is that the scripted parts of the congregation is to speak

are also the parts they'd rather not – the bystanders' accusation of Peter, the crowd's demand for Barrabas, and the onlookers' derision of Jesus on the cross. Whether the congregation participates in this way or whether these gospel lines are left to a single reader, they can be some of the most impactful in this passage. In the actions of those people in Scriptures, we see the ways in which we fall short – the ways in which we, like those at the time of Jesus, fail to recognize him for who he is. They cannot fathom a messiah and a God who would suffer, who would identify himself with the least rather than the greatest, who would show humility rather than bravado – instead, they envision God as they themselves are. In this gospel reading, we are invited to recognize our own inadequacy and imperfection, so that we can appreciate God's love all the more.

To Experience: The arc of Palm Sunday begins with the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem in the first gospel reading, but immediately after shifts to his passion and death. This transition is abrupt, but maybe something we can find parallel to our own lives. At one moment, it's easy to recognize the grandeur of God and his care for us, and in the next, we find ourselves unable to find God's presence anywhere at all. As we experience this "crucifixion," we can take consolation in knowing how this story ends – with the resurrection of Jesus on the third day.

The Discipleship Small Group gatherings that our parishes have been sponsoring this Lenten season have been very interesting. We have been viewing the series, "The Search". Even if you did not join a small group, you can access this series on formed.org. I highly recommend that you do.

At the end of each small group session there is an "Action Item" that encourages us to put what we have learned and discussed into practice that week. The "Action Item" recently was to go and ask someone who you have hurt for their forgiveness. Ouch! That is a hard one to say the least. But it occurred to me as people were talking, that it certainly takes two to complete this act of forgiveness.

Asking for someone's forgiveness is tough and requires courage. How many times have we knowingly hurt someone and we refuse to apologize and ask for their forgiveness? We often justify what we did by thinking, "What I said to them wasn't that bad. It was the truth, or it will blow over in time." I believe this is especially true when it comes to people we love, family. We find it easier to apologize to strangers than people we truly care about. Sometimes we even think that we can just stay out of someone's way or do something nice instead of apologizing. The truth is that nothing can replace the words coming from our mouths: I'm sorry, please forgive me. Let's face it, apologizing and asking for forgiveness requires humility.










The other side of the street is to forgive those that have wronged us. Today's society thrives on drama. People want to get offended over what someone said and we take things out of context. We have to remember that people don't always express themselves the way that they want to, they make mistakes. Sometimes we are hurt by someone's carelessness, but there are times we are intentionally wronged and hurt. In either instance, we must put aside our personal ideas of justice and aim for what is truly good. Let's face it, accepting an apology and forgiving requires humility.

To forgive is not just between you and the other person it needs to include the Lord. So many times, we say we forgive but we still hold that piece of a grudge inside our hearts, or we refuse to be seen with them, we forget to love them again. Just as the Lord loves us even though we continually wrong Him.

In these remaining days of Lent, there is still time to ask the Lord for forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It does require courage and humility to go to Confession, but Jesus is waiting to hear your words of apology so that you can hear his words of forgiveness.

In this final week before Easter, find the humility to pray for those who have hurt you. Find the humility to reach out to those you have hurt and ask for forgiveness. Find the humility to go talk to the Lord in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and admit your wrongs and receive the grace of His forgiveness.

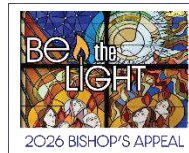

A Catholic Guide to Holy Week Symbols

Palm Branches (Palm Sunday)

Holy Week begins on the Sunday before Easter, known as Palm Sunday. Palm Sunday is named after the palm branches the Jews used to praise Jesus as he entered Jerusalem at the start of his Passion. Palms were an important symbol in Jewish history.

Specifically, Jesus entered Jerusalem during **Passover**, a volatile time of year when Jews celebrated their liberation from Egyptian bondage while also yearning for liberation from Roman control. It was during this time of unrest that Jesus publicly announced his Messianic mission by riding into Jerusalem on a donkey, in fulfillment of **Zechariah's** promise of a peacemaking king for Israel. In their yearning for a king who'd liberate them from their Roman occupiers, the Jewish crowds welcomed Jesus with **palm branches**, which in biblical times symbolized **victory over oppressors**.



In commemoration of Jesus' triumphant entry into the Holy City, Catholics use palms on Palm Sunday to welcome our Savior at the beginning of Holy Week.

Purple Veils on Statues

During Holy Week (or as early as the fifth Sunday of Lent), some churches cover crosses, statues, and other sacred depictions (not including the **Stations of the Cross** or stained glass windows) with purple veils. The **Roman Missal** instructs that, in churches observing this practice, "[c]rosses remain covered until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil" on Holy Saturday.

This veiling of sacred items reminds us that, without Jesus' ultimate sacrifice and glorious Resurrection on Easter Sunday, our faith and everything sacred related to it wouldn't exist.

Bread and Wine (Holy Thursday)

Among the most poignant symbols of Holy Week are the bread and wine. These images recall Jesus' institution of the **Holy Eucharist** at the Last Supper on the day before his crucifixion. During that Passover meal, Jesus offered himself as the sacrificial lamb by transforming bread and wine into his own Body and Blood.

After the Last Supper on that first Holy Thursday, the Apostles were invited to keep **vigil** with the Body and Blood during Jesus' agony in the garden. In observance of that

event, Catholics remove the Eucharist from the tabernacle on Holy Thursday and place it on an altar of repose where the faithful can keep vigil with Christ through the **Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament**.

Holy Oils (Holy Thursday)

Scripture tells us that God's people used olive oil to **anoint**, **consecrate**, and **heal**. In keeping with that rich tradition, Catholic bishops celebrate a Chrism Mass on Holy Thursday in which they bless three types of holy oils made from olive oil: holy chrism oil, the oil of catechumens, and the oil of the sick. Once blessed, these sacred oils are used during the Easter Vigil, and throughout the year in the Church's administration of the **Sacraments** of Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders, and the Anointing of the Sick, as well as in the dedication ceremonies of new churches.

A Towel (Holy Thursday)

The imagery of a towel recalls the moment when Christ, as one of his last acts on Earth, wrapped a **towel** around his waist and washed his Apostles' feet at the Last Supper.

To honor that call to service, Catholics participate in a washing of the feet ceremony on Holy Thursday. During the ceremony, up to 12 volunteers sit in front of the congregation and place their bare feet in a bowl. A priest, assisted by ministers, pours water over and dries the feet of the volunteers, sometimes also kissing their feet.

Crown of Thorns (Good Friday)

A vivid reminder of Christ's suffering, this symbol recalls the **crown of thorns** the Roman soldiers twisted together and placed on Jesus' head as they mocked him as the King of the Jews before the Crucifixion.

The Cross (Good Friday)

The most common symbol of Christianity, undoubtedly, is the cross. First used as a tool of torture and death, the cross has become the sign of salvation for Christians.

Veneration of the cross on Good Friday **originated** in fourth-century Jerusalem and continues to this day. Veiled crosses are unveiled on Good Friday to emphasize Christ's redeeming death on the cross that day. The faithful then approach the cross in procession to kneel before, touch, or kiss the symbol of Christ's sacrifice.

Fire (Holy Saturday)

Jesus is the **Light of the World**, and the image of fire epitomizes that title. Fire exemplifies Jesus' power in leading the world out of darkness when he defeated death that first Holy Saturday by rising again on the first Easter Sunday.

Holy Saturday's Easter Vigil concludes Holy Week. The Easter Vigil often begins with the congregation's gathering around a fire lit outside the church to symbolize the conquering of darkness. The Easter candle is lit from this fire. The congregation then lights their own individual candles from this Paschal candle, signifying our call to spread the light of Christ to the world.



Journey to the Heart of Christ

Our parish-wide stewardship journey is currently focusing on Prayer. Prayer is essential for every faith-filled Catholic. It is necessary for developing a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Are you growing your prayer life?

- **Last weekend's witness talks shared messages of personal prayer from fellow parishioners.** If you were blessed to have heard either story, it is our hope that a concept, message, or individual words have stuck with you. May you be inspired to think differently about prayer, begin your own prayer walk, or add to the prayers you already pray. Thank you to Danielle and Theresa for opening your hearts and sharing with all of us!
- **Continue to pray** for your Parish Prayer Partner. As we enter Holy Week, consider sending a message or Easter card to your Partner Family.
- **Finalize plans now to attend** Palm Sunday Mass, Masses during the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday), and Easter Sunday as a family.
- **Intentions from the Heart** Write a prayer intention on a heart and hang it up (on the tree at SG or on the bulletin board at HT). Glance at a few of the other intentions hanging up and say a prayer for someone else's needs, trials, and/or thanksgivings.
