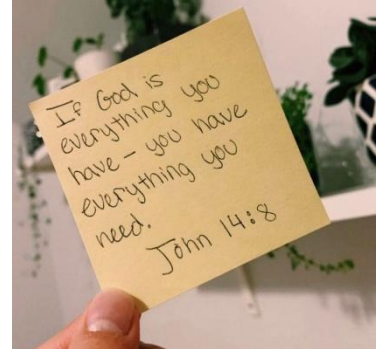

Right Before Our Eyes

In today's Gospel, Philip's request "**Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us**" echoes the longing we all share. Like Philip, we often find ourselves searching for a "sign"—something clear, spectacular, or undeniable to hold onto when life feels uncertain.

We tend to view God the Father as distant or abstract, but Jesus' response is a gentle yet profound correction: "**Have I been with you all this time, and you still do not know me?**"



Jesus reveals that we do not need to go searching for God in the heavens; **the invisible Father has made Himself fully visible and accessible in the Person of Jesus.**

To see how Jesus loves, heals, and forgives is to see exactly what the Father's heart looks like. He is not merely a map-maker showing us the way; **He is the Way.**

This week, let us stop searching for a distant God and start recognizing the One who is already standing right before us.

What currently "troubles your heart"? Can you hand that burden over to the One who has been walking beside you all this time? As you go about your days, ask yourself: *Where have I seen the "works of the Father" through Jesus in my own life this week?*

By recognizing Him, we find the "dwelling place" of peace that the world cannot provide.

Thoughts for Today's Readings



To the Point: The lectionary readings for this Sunday build on last week's selections. Again, we have one of John's "I am" statements from

Jesus, who asserts that he alone is the path to the Father. While last week's gospel intimated that Jesus would lead us somewhere, this week the circumstances are more concretely spelled out. We will not be able to dwell in Eastertide forever – Jesus must ascend to the Father, and we must return to Ordinary Time. Where last week's readings centered more abstractly on the call of Jesus, this week invites us to consider more concretely what that call is for. The word of God must lead us to action. To recognize Jesus as way, truth, and life requires us to allow the Holy Spirit to conform us into Jesus' image, even as he is to return to the Father. If we are to enter the place prepared for us, we must do the works that Jesus does, letting love transform us and our world.

To Experience: We can often find ourselves feeling like Thomas and Philip in the gospel today – unsure of God's plan for us and looking for a sign, a concrete and undeniable action from God. Jesus' response to both men is this: "Look to me." Jesus himself is that sign for us, God who took on our human nature to show us the depth of God's love for us.

1. Jesus tells the disciples, "Do not let your hearts be troubled." Do you find this instruction encouraging or do you, like the apostles, find it challenging? What fears or concerns might be helpful to bring to Jesus?

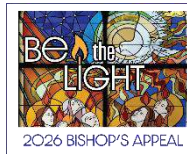

Show Mary Some Love

This month, pay some extra attention to Mary. Here are some ways:

- **Set up a May altar.** Find a statue or picture of Mary and place it in a prominent location in your house. Surround it with flowers and candles. Each evening, take some time as a family to gather around the altar and recite the Rosary or pray a few Hail Marys.
- **Get out your rosary.** One of the ways Mary is honored in May is often by recitations of the Rosary, sometimes in the parish setting. Arrive early at Mass to participate in praying the Rosary. Gather your family to pray the Rosary together or find some quiet time to recite it by yourself.
- **Bring Mary to the garden.** Many flowers you can find in your garden are named in honor of Mary. If you have an outdoor statue of Mary, plant flowers such as columbine and lily of the valley in the area around the statue.
- **Pay a visit.** Check to see if there are any Marian shrines or churches named in her honor in your area. If so, plan a trip to go and visit
- **Introduce Mary.** Talk to your kids about Mary and the role she has in our faith. Ask them what they know about her.





Prayer Witness Talks

Happy Divine Mercy Sunday. I find it fitting and Divinely providential that I'm the one speaking on Divine Mercy Sunday, since I'm also one who left the Catholic Church about a year after Divine Mercy Sunday was instituted, and I spent about 2 decades trying to deepen my faith and find God's mercy at various protestant churches in the area.

The Lord would have it that during this 20-year hiatus from the Church, I would have my first encounter with The Divine Mercy. On November 5, 2010, I was in a hospital bed, being taken down the hall to the OR for a procedure after learning hours prior that the baby I was expecting to be healthy at nearly 15 weeks pregnant, no longer had a heartbeat. As I was being wheeled away, my mom was standing in the room behind me, and she started yelling down the hall, "Jesus, I trust in you! Jesus, I trust in you! Jesus, I trust in you!" I remember laying there overwhelmed with grief, thinking, "How is that even helpful right now?" and figured it was some Catholic thing she was trying to impose on me. I was somewhat correct in that, it is Catholic; "Jesus, I trust in you," is the signature on the Divine Mercy image that was painted according to the vision St. Faustina had of our Lord.

Unfortunately, in the 10 years my husband and I spent growing our family, that wouldn't be the only traumatic loss of one of our babies. The emotional rollercoaster of that decade had me feeling like some other version of myself on many occasions. The fear and anxiety that something horrific would happen to one of my children would send me into a spiral of dark thoughts some nights as I lay awake plotting and planning ways, I could keep my babies safe in the event one of my imagined nightmare scenarios actually came true.

Finally, one night, in complete desperation to stop worrying about things I had absolutely no control over, I said to the Lord, "I'm done; You can have it," and I just surrendered all of my fears to Him in that moment. That little prayer became my lifeline. Anytime I began to worry about my kids, or a pregnancy, or anything else, I'd just stop myself and say, "I'm done; You can have it," and I'd give it over to God. Selfishly, I was glad to lift the momentary mental and emotional burden of worry off of myself, but what I began to notice with time was that not only was the Lord mercifully taking my fear, but He was also using my habit of saying this little prayer to actually draw me closer to Himself and to help me to rely on and trust Him in a deeper way. "I'm done; You can have it" was basically my version of "Jesus, I trust in you," and I can now understand why that was the prayer my mom chose to yell at me in the hospital hall all of those years ago. Trusting in the Lord with every aspect of life and resting in His mercy and divine will, doesn't eliminate struggle, but it does bring about an incredible sense of peace and freedom. Trustful surrender to Divine providence doesn't require long, complicated prayers. Simple prayers, repeated consistently over time, can begin to alter the interior of our hearts so that we more quickly seek out and trust in God for all things - good and bad.

I would encourage anyone who's ever felt like they aren't good at praying, or they don't have a lot of prayers

memorized, or they don't have enough time to pray to just start simple. "Jesus, I trust in You," is a perfect simple prayer to start with and it can bring about the child-like humility and trust that we need in our faith. Talk to the Lord throughout your day as though He's a visible loving, caring and concerned father, and see how your faith and trust in Him deepens, despite your circumstances, as you embrace His Divine Mercy and perfect will for your life. Jesus we trust in you.

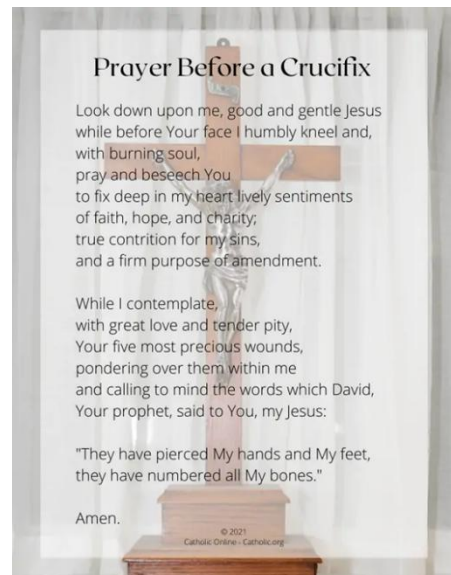
In my life, I can testify that *prayer* is talking to God and listening to Him. We are on a journey and prayer goes with us every step of the way.

In 2013, a tragedy struck my family – my 16-yr old nephew committed suicide. My little brother was hurt and angry at God. I knew it wasn't God's fault, but I didn't have the explanation or words to comfort him. So, I *prayed* and went to our priest, Fr. Pat, for advice. Fr. Pat reassured me that sometimes bad things happen to good people and he encouraged me to read the Gospel of Mark. As I read, I could feel the Holy Spirit moving in me! I was compelled to read all the Gospels. Words were coming to light and meaning became deeper. I started reading at the kid's soccer practice, and every chance I had, from Genesis to Revelations. God had a plan! As God showed me His Divine Love and Mercy, I opened myself up to share it with others, trusting God would show me the way. Doors would open, and God would give me the courage to walk through.

One prayer I prayed for my nephew, and I would like to share with you, is the "Prayer Before the Crucifix." This prayer brought me closer to Jesus, as I meditated on His suffering for me and the whole world – each wound, each labored breath, His loneliness. Jesus longs for each person to look at Him! Really look with your mind's eye, your heart, your body, and your soul! Jesus desires to talk with you!

Now please join me in the "Prayer Before the Crucifix."
