Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: In this gospel, Jesus demonstrates the importance of a physical house of worship. Its abuse is the cause of his famous act of righteous anger, when his full humanity is on display. At the same time, though, he shows us the ultimate unimportance of such places; they will not be needed in God's kingdom, when all the world contains the fullness of God's presence and all of life is lived liturgically, given as an offering to God. When he talks about "this temple" being destroyed and raised up. Jesus is not referring to the literal temple before him but to his own body. It is his body, his presence, that makes a place sacred and that will endure long after the world as we know it is gone.

To Experience: This feast celebrates the dedication of the Basilica of Saint John Lateran in Rome. Although St. Peter's Basilica is better known, St. John Lateran is the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome and the seat of the pope – and is therefore the mother church of Catholics throughout the world. Celebrating this feast acknowledges our unity even amid diversity beyond what we can comprehend. It also says something about the importance of place. It would be very easy not to name a single building as mother church for our wonderfully global community, but we do have one, which anchors us and binds us together.

1. Which church buildings or other sacred spaces have served as a spiritual home for you?
2. If you have made a long-distance move in your lifetime, how did you find a new place of worship? What makes a place meaningful for you?
3. What does it mean to you when St. Paul claims that you are a temple of God and a dwelling of the Holy Spirit? How can you live your life to make that reality more apparent?

The True Temple

The Gospel of John (2:13-22) presents a powerful image of Jesus' zeal for God's house at the beginning of his public ministry. Arriving in Jerusalem for the Passover, Jesus finds the Temple courts filled with merchants selling oxen, sheep, and doves, and money-changers at their tables.

This commercial activity had turned the area meant for Gentile worship into a bustling marketplace, hindering true prayer and reverence. Jesus, in an act of righteous indignation, makes a whip of cords, drives out the animals and merchants, and overturns their tables, declaring, "Do not make my Father's house a house of trade".

This dramatic act of cleansing was a symbolic critique of a religious system that had lost its focus on God. When challenged by the Jewish leaders to provide a sign of his authority, Jesus gives an enigmatic response: "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up". The leaders naturally assume he means the physical structure, which had been under construction for 46 years. However, John's Gospel clarifies that "he was speaking about the temple of his body".

This passage points to a profound shift in how God's presence is encountered. The physical Temple in Jerusalem, which would later be destroyed in A.D. 70, was a foreshadowing of the true dwelling place of God: the body of Jesus Christ, made perfect through his death and resurrection. Through Christ, the need for animal sacrifices and a single, physical location for worship is fulfilled and superseded.

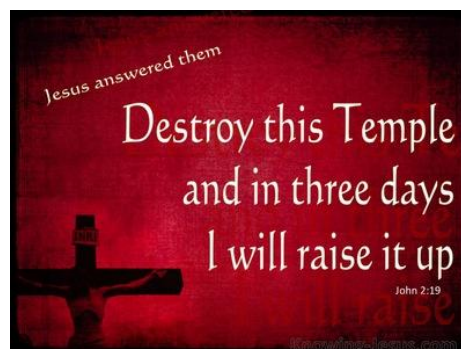
For us today, this passage reminds us that our own bodies, and the collective body of believers (the Church), are now the temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 6:19-20). Jesus' zeal for purity challenges us to examine our lives and hearts, removing the "merchandise" of sin, materialism, and distractions that clutter our focus and hinder genuine worship.

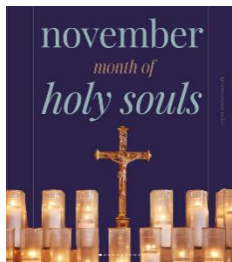
True worship is not tied to a building but to a relationship with God through Christ, in spirit and in truth. May we strive to honor God with our whole lives, ensuring that His dwelling place is a place of prayer and devotion, not personal gain or distraction.

The Tree of Souls: Remembering Our Departed Loved Ones in November

November is a time in the Church dedicated to praying for the souls of those who departed from this life. To help us remember our loved ones, we reinstate the Tree of Souls – a beautiful symbol where we hang the names of family members, friends, and all those who have gone before us. This tree stands as a reminder of our connection to them and our duty to pray for their eternal rest.

The Tree of Souls is not just a decoration; it represents life, memory, and hope. In the Bible, trees are often symbols of life and growth. As we write the names of our loved ones and place them on the tree, we are reminded of their lives and the impact they had on us. This simple act of placing their names on the tree becomes a form of prayer, lifting their souls up to God.

The entire month of November, however, is traditionally set aside to pray for the souls in purgatory, asking God to grant them eternal peace. You may have family members or friends who have passed away. Praying for them, as well as for those who have no one to pray for them, is a loving and merciful act.

Participating in the Tree of Souls is simple yet meaningful. You can write down the names of those who have passed away – whether family, friends, or others you want to pray for – and place the names on the tree. As you do so, take a moment to pray for them. Your prayers can be short and from the heart. You might say something like:

“Lord, I pray for (name), that you may forgive their sins and grant them eternal rest in Your presence. Amen.”

The Tree of Souls reminds us that love never dies, and neither does our connection to those who have gone before us. By praying for them, we help them on their journey to eternal life and keep their memory alive in our hearts.

Story of the Dedication of Saint John Lateran Basilica – November 9

Most Catholics think of St. Peter's as the pope's main church, but they are wrong. Saint John Lateran is the pope's church, the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome where the Bishop of Rome presides.

The first basilica on the site was built in the fourth century when Constantine donated land he had received from the wealthy Lateran family. That structure and its successors suffered fire, earthquake, and the ravages of war, but the Lateran remained the church where popes were consecrated. In the 14th century when the papacy returned to Rome from Avignon, the church and the adjoining palace were found to be in ruins.

Pope Innocent X commissioned the present structure in 1646. One of Rome's most imposing churches, the Lateran's towering facade is crowned with 15 colossal statues of Christ, John the Baptist, John the Evangelist, and 12 doctors of the Church. Beneath its high altar rest the remains of the small wooden table on which tradition holds Saint Peter himself celebrated Mass.

Reflection

Unlike the commemorations of other Roman churches, this anniversary is a feast. The dedication of a church is a feast for all its parishioners. In a sense, St. John Lateran is the parish church of all Catholics, because it is the pope's cathedral. This church is the spiritual home of the people who are the Church.
